HISTORY

Brentford is believed to have been the site of a battle between Julius Caesar's troops and the local king Cassivellaunus in 54BC. Hounslow Heath had been used as a military encampment by both Oliver Cromwell and James II around the time of the English Civil War

As a young man Vincent Van Gogh, worked as a Teaching Assistant in Isleworth and French impressionist Lucien Pissarro lived in Chiswick. William Hogarth spent a lot of his life here and his old house has been turned into a museum near the A4

TECHNOLOGY

Kew Bridge Pumping Station was originally opened in 1838 and pumped water from the Thames for over 100 years going on to house six steam pumping engines as well as four Allen diesel pumps. The site is now a renowned museum and testament to the industrious age of London. Recently you will find Hounslow as the base for the likes of GSK, Sky TV and electronic games maker SEGA
